The current COVID-19 Delta Variant surge is causing grave concern here in the Islands. In Honolulu County, the Mayor's Office confirmed that there are no changes with regard to churches. Social distancing of six feet between groups of no more than ten is required.

For Episcopalians in all Counties, social distancing of six feet between household units ("groups"), masks to be worn by everyone throughout worship (indoors or outdoors), and no singing are the current "Delta Variant" norms. Please note, 'Ohana Sunday is suspended for the month of October. We will have two services at 8am and 10am. All services will be livestreamed.

Every Perfect Gift

What is the best gift you have ever received?

Makana kā hoʻi! What a gift! Over the years I have received many gifts from students, friends, and family members. When we think of a "gift," we typically think of a thing such as a coffee mug, a gift card from Starbucks, or an "ugly" sweater at Christmas. Other gifts in my life have been camping at Bellows with my family, bird hunting with my grandfather, baking with my grandmother, not to mention my education, a chance to study abroad in New Zealand, the birth of our child, or a surprise 25th ordination anniversary celebration.

Every Perfect Gift

What do such gifts offer, aside from the pleasure of the possession or experience? They teach us about living in the moment, and appreciating what one has. They also taught us generosity, for the delight we have in experiencing such gifts called us to share such moments and experiences with others. This is the relationship between receiving and generosity, and it's a pattern, that, once it takes root in us, continues in perpetuity. The more we practice generosity, the more abundance we recognize around us.

Every Generous Act

It is our practice to sing the Doxology as our gifts - the elements of the Eucharist and our offerings — are brought to the altar for blessing. We do it "Hawaiian Style" in the Hawaiian language— "Ho'onani i ka Makua mau..." "Praise God, from whom all blessings flow..." These words remind us of the font from which springs all generosity, all love, all gifts. In offering our gifts at the altar, we reflect on the cycle of giving and receiving God's abundance that first began when light was made manifest in the Creation, in the calling of prophets, and in the gift of God's own son on Earth. **As we share our gifts through the Eucharist and through our service to the world, we participate in the ongoing creation of abundance and generosity.**

What is the best gift you have ever received?

The theme and image for Every Perfect Gift are wrapped in the metaphor of the butterfly and chrysalis. Of all the metaphors of a gift that could be used, why did we decide on this one?

To the ancient Greeks, the butterfly represented the image of rebirth and freedom. The word they used for butterfly was psyche, and if you are thinking that sounds familiar, you are correct! It also means spirit. The humble and beautiful butterfly contains the philosophical and spiritual idea of the soul breaking free from its shell — free to discover, to inspire, to create, to communicate, to share.

These are also spiritual gifts, gifts that when we free ourselves to serve in the world, we need and share with others; and they are gifts of our stewardship. As we share our time, talent, and treasure with our church and with the world, we unleash those same gifts in our communities: discovery, inspiration, creativity, communication, and sharing. Through the ministries that are enabled by our gifts, the inspiration we show to our neighbors to unlock their generosity in the world, and the stories we tell about ourselves and our experiences, we participate with God in an abundant vision for the world. Every perfect gift comes from God above.

BBQ Fundraiser Postponed





STEWARDSHIP, TITHING, AND PLEDGES - WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

Every year in congregations across the church, the attentions of vestries, Bishops' Committees, and clergy turn toward thoughts of "the every member canvass," "annual campaign," "stewardship," and "tithing" (words that for the most part are not part of the average 21st century American's vocabulary). It's hard to ignore the bottom line as the church forms the budget for the coming year. We hope to glean pledges toward the operating budget for the coming year so we can know whether or not we can commit to salaries, our campus buildings, programs, and projects. Even more, we hope to encourage everyone to remember the abundant gifts with which we have all been blessed by God and that we give freely out of that abundance.

We will hear the words "stewardship," "tithe," and "pledge" being used and I wanted to offer some definitions that can help us sort out the connections and misunderstandings between money and faith.



Stewardship/Mālama

Until the late twentieth century, "stewardship" was equated with something called The Every Member Canvass [sic]. The Every Member Canvass was often also called "the Stewardship Campaign". Stewardship meant giving to the church, giving money. And tithe was the word used to describe what someone gave to the church, whatever the amount. Stewardship, tithe, every member canvass, all pointed to the same thing: money to the local church.

Then sometime in the 1980s, a corrective movement hit the wider church. It began to see that "stewardship" was about a whole lot more than money. Simply put, Stewardship came to be understood as "all that we have, and all we do, all the time." It is rooted in the belief that who we are and what we have and the life we live and the world in which we live is all a gift from God: "the earth is the Lord's and all that is in it," says the Psalmist. And we are stewards of all that God has given.

A steward is a manager, a person who has charge of a household or possessions of another. In our case, we are stewards of God's household, God's possessions, whether that is nature, children/grandchildren, buildings, time, talent, or money. If we realize that all the stuff we have belongs to God and we see ourselves as the stewards of it, then we hear the call to mālama or care, protect, tend, and mindfully use it as God would have us use it. This makes much more sense that simply "giving 10%" back to God.

Tithing

Speaking of 10%... Ten percent is a good guideline, a goal especially when it comes to giving away our money. It is the biblical standard and comes from the spirit of Jacob's promise in Genesis 28:20-22: 'If God will be with me, and will keep me in this way that I go, and will give me bread to eat and clothing to wear, so that I come again to my father's house in peace, then the LORD shall be my God, and this stone, which I have set up for a pillar, shall be God's house; and of all that you give me I will surely give one-tenth to you.'

Tithing is a discipline. It is also an extraordinary faith statement, a way of reminding ourselves that God is God, that we are God's people, and that God provides for us, even when the household budget is tight. We cannot escape the historic practice that tithing is giving away 10% of our income, either to individuals in need or to organizations that make known God's compassion, justice, and transformative power. However, the ultimate goal is not a firm 10%, but rather a sense of offering something tangible back to God. We have a spirit of abundant generosity with all that we have, with all that we do, all of the time.

Therefore, when it comes to our tithe, it is appropriate that we NOT focus so much on income alone. Ideally, we give ourselves to God, 100%. And we also give generously from the resources we have been given. We are God's stewards, the means, the conduits, if you will, for God's stuff to be used for God's purpose. For several years now, the Episcopal Church has declared the tithe to be "the minimum standard of giving." Realizing that many Episcopalians are far from giving away 10%, the Church encourages people to "strive to tithe", or to work toward ten percent by giving a percentage rather than a set dollar amount, even if it's just two percent to start with, and working to increase that percentage year by year.



Making a Pledge


Pledging itself has little to do with stewardship. Rather, it has to do commitment and with budget planning. Pledging is to make a commitment to support an organization. When people are able to estimate their giving ahead of time and pledge a particular amount, then the Bishop's Committee is able to determine a budget for the year and establish certain priorities, commitments, and expectations. Even people who are averse to pledging can be convinced of its merits when it comes to making commitments to staff and program. As a church we must be transparent and clear about our needs.

It gets complicated, too, when we realize that more and more people are living in times of fiscal uncertainty or fixed incomes in retirement. Some are living with large debts or are supporting children or grandchildren with school expenses or tuition. A pledge is not a binding contract, but a promise to help fund the mission of the church/St. Timothy's. We would hope that those who do pledge take their budget into careful consideration and give out of their abundance. If at some point people need to adjust their pledge (up or down), it is handled as a pastoral matter, privately with the priest. We should also say this: It is not good stewardship for people to defer rent/mortgage or loan payments, borrow money, take on more credit card debt or otherwise put themselves at financial risk in order to give to the church.

As much as the local church needs pledges and funds, the goal is not to meet the budget, but rather the transformation of souls into the Way of Jesus. Clear and open teaching about stewardship and the tithe, about giving and pledging, helps to get us there.
